NOTIFY US OF CHANGES AND ADDITIONS

PALM SUNDAY

First Reading: Isaiah 50:4-7

Isaiah describes the pain and insults of the Servant of God. Yet he sounds hopeful when describing God as his help, knowing he will not be disgraced.

Second Reading: Philippians 2:6-11

Paul exults Christ's great sacrifice of humbling himself to become human and die on the cross. He explains that this is why we should now realize the importance of honoring both his name and memory.

Gospel: Mark 14:1—15:47

Mark describes the events leading up to Christ's crucifixion. The Last Supper is described, explaining where the Eucharist began. Judas betrays Jesus and his suffering at the hands of the Sanhedrin (Council) is detailed.

THE THREE MOST SACRED DAYS

The Easter Triduum is the most ancient and central celebration of the Church's liturgical year. The Church no longer considers these days as part of Lent but instead has made them into a special liturgical season all its own. The three days recall Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples (Holy Thursday), his crucifixion and death (Good Friday) and his resurrection (Easter Vigil and Easter Day). Then for the fifty days of the Easter season we bask in the joy of Christ's resurrection and the promise that the relationship with God begun on earth cannot be stopped by death but will be transformed into new life with God forever.

During these three days, we immerse ourselves at home and at church in the most sacred memory of our relationship with God. The paschal mystery of Christ's [passion, death and resurrection is the heart of what God wants to tell us about God's own self and about ourselves in relation to God. As we remember Jesus' passion, death and resurrection, we come face to face with the mystery of our own dying and rising.

HOLY THURSDAY

On Holy Thursday the church celebrates Jesus' final meal with his disciples and the institution of the Eucharist. The regular Eucharistic ritual is enhanced by the rite of footwashing, recalling how Jesus washed his disciples' feet (Jn13:1-20). After the liturgy, the consecrated bread is transferred to a side altar and kept in a tabernacle for adoration. Then the altar is stripped.

GOOD FRIDAY

Good Friday is the only day of the year on which Mass is not said. The altar is bare, and the liturgy consists of proclaiming the passion story from John's Gospel, intercessions, veneration of the cross and a communion service with bread consecrated on Holy Thursday. Some parishes might also have a meditation on the way of the Cross (Stations of the Cross) or meditations on the seven last words of Christ.

THE GREAT VIGIL OF EASTER

The Easter Vigil echoes the early Christian ritual that lasted through the night to celebrate the Eucharist at dawn. Only the Eucharist itself is older than the Easter Vigil liturgy. This service re-enacts the passage from death into life. On this night, we celebrate our deliverance by Christ our Passover and look forward to the day when we shall see him face to face. Its four parts are: the lighting of the Easter candle, the scripture readings recounting the story of our salvation, the initiation of the new converts (or the renewal of our baptismal commitments if there are no baptisms) culmination in the celebration of the Eucharist.

GUIDELINES TO MAKE A GOOD CONFESSION

My dear Brothers and Sisters,

As you are aware, we have our Reconciliation Monday on March 26th from 3 PM to 9 PM. Here are some guidelines to make good Confession before Easter.

Examine your conscience using the Ten Commandments first. Examine your conscience to check whether you succumbed to one of the **Seven Deadly Sins: Lust, Gluttony, Greed, Sloth, Wrath, Envy and Pride.**

Examine your conscience with the **Precepts of the Church. Attending Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation, Observing the days of fast and abstinence, Making a good confession once a year, Receive the Eucharist once a year during Easter, To maintain the stewardship of your Church.**

Examine your conscience with **Corporal Works of Mercy: Feeding the hungry, Give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, shelter the homeless, comfort the prisoners, visit the sick and bury the dead.** Examine your conscience with **Spiritual Works of Mercy: Teach the ignorant, Pray for the living and dead, Correct sinners, Counsel those in doubt, Console the sorrowful, bear wrongs patiently and Forgive wrongs willingly.**
